Please also note that Mr. Conway will host a parent round table discussion about social media next Tuesday morning, from 10:00-11:00 AM.

As of this morning, only 58% of families had completed the survey (80% of families responding in Korean, 67% of families responding in English, and 42% of families responding in Chinese). our community, and I therefore do kindly request that you support our efforts to improve the quality of our services by providing us with this important feedback ... and especially those families who are completing the Chinese version. Thank you!

Finally, I understand that Mr. Conway shared some comments about **the value of personal tutors** at a recent parent forum that he fears may have been misunderstood to suggest that all students need tutors! Clearly this is not the case at all, but just in case there was any misunderstanding about his comments, he asked that I share the following note of clarification:

"At a recent parent session, a question arose about mathematics tutoring. To clarify: our teachers are fully committed to supporting every student through careful differentiation in class — whether a child needs extra scaffolding to build confidence or additional challenge to extend their thinking. For students who find mathematics particularly difficult, we will always provide targeted in-class support. That said, some families find that an external tutor offers valuable one-to-one time that complements what we do at school. Similarly, for students who are already performing well but whose families aspire to the most competitive STEM pathways at top universities, a specialist tutor can sometimes help develop the extra speed and depth required. The choice to engage a tutor remains entirely a personal family decision; our classroom programme continues to meet the needs of the great majority of our students."

### International School of Tianjin Scholarship Program

The International School of Tianjin (IST) is excited to announce its scholarship program for students in their final two years of school. This initiative serves two key purposes:

- Support for Current IST Students: We offer exceptional educational opportunities to talented students facing financial challenges.
- Enrichment for Non-IST Students: We welcome talented non-IST students to enhance our diverse community and the quality of our IB Diploma Programme.

### Scholarship Details

### Types of Scholarships

Scholarships are available for students entering Grade 11, with awards lasting up to two years:

- Full Scholarships: Cover all tuition and capital fees for Grades 11 and 12.
- Tuition Scholarships: Cover tuition fees only for Grades 11 and 12.
- Bursaries: Cover half the tuition fees for Grades 11 and 12.

### Benefits

Students in the scholarship program will receive an excellent education, culminating in the IST High School Diploma. As an IB World School, students also have the chance to earn a full IB Diploma, *recognized by top universities worldwide*.

### **Selection Process**

Each year, up to three scholarships or bursaries may be awarded to current IST students, with an equal number available for non-IST applicants. The selection includes:

- Examinations
- Formal Interviews
- Final Decision by the IST Scholarship Committee

### Criteria for Selection:

- Academic Excellence:
  - o Current IST students must have honors/high honors in at least 2 of the last 3 semesters.
  - o Non-IST candidates should be in the top 25% of their class.
- Community Contribution:
  - o Active involvement in CAS activities.
  - o Promotion of the IB Diploma Programme.
  - o Leadership within the school community.
- Financial Need: Consideration for current IST students needing financial assistance. (Non-IST students DO NOT need to demonstrate financial need.)

### **Eligibility**

Students of *all nationalities* are encouraged to apply. Current IST students with financial difficulties can apply, but families may receive only one full scholarship

A strong command of English is essential.

### **Application Process**

To apply, candidates should request an application package from the school.

- Scholarship Examinations: Saturday, February 28, 2026 (9:00am-2:30pm)
- Interviews: Around March 4, 2026
- Award Anouncement: Late March/early April 2026

### **Required Documents**

### From the Student:

- Personal statement covering your interests and reasons for applying.
- Previous two years' report cards from your school. (Including IST students)
  - o Certificates for any honors or awards received.
- At least two character reference letters (non-family).
  - IST students do not need a character reference but should give the names of two teachers who agree to support the application.
- Any other relevant details.

### From the IST Parent (if applicable):

- A formal letter explaining financial circumstances.
- A letter from an employer stating that tuition is not covered by the company.
- Non-IST students DO NOT need to demonstrate financial need.

### **Application Fee**

A 2,000 RMB application fee is required, with the following conditions:

- Refunds: Full scholarship recipients or those not awarded a scholarship will receive a complete
  refund
- 2. Tuition Scholarships/Bursaries: The fee will be credited towards the standard application fee.
- 3. **Declined Offers**: Candidates who decline a scholarship offer forfeit the fee.

### Scholarship Selection Process

### **Application**

To apply for a scholarship, students must submit the Scholarship Application Form and Fee by 3:30pm on Friday, February 13, 2026. This form collects personal details and educational history.

### Important:

- Attach all required documents (see 'Required Documents' section).
- Incomplete or late applications will not be considered.

### **Examinations**

Exams will take place at the school on **Saturday**, **February 28**, from **9:00am to 2:00pm**. Students will complete three papers:

- Mathematics (9:00am–10:30am)
   Focus: Mathematical skills and problem-solving.
- English (10:45am–12:15pm)
   Focus: Reading comprehension and essay writing.

Science (12:30pm-1:45pm)
 Focus: General problem-solving, logic skills, and scientific writing (not based on specific course content).

### Interview

After the exams, selected candidates will be invited for an interview with the selection panel, which includes the Director, Secondary Principal, Diploma Coordinator, and IST Board of Governors members. Discussion topics will include the student's potential contributions to the school and their shortand long-term goals. Feel free to bring supporting materials to the interview.

Interviews will be scheduled for March 4 unless otherwise notified.

### Results

Candidates will receive their results by late March/early April. Good luck!


### THANK YOU TO OUR STAFF AND COMMUNITY



### **Racing Ahead**

Ruby's High-Speed Journey to the Podium

While most students spend their weekends catching up on homework or relaxing with friends, Ruby [Last Name] can often be found wearing a racing suit and helmet, preparing to take on some of the fastest young drivers around.

In 2023, Ruby made her mark in both the CKC (China Karting Championship) and RMCC, claiming multiple championships and runner-up finishes. Her season highlight came with a stunning victory at the RMCC World Championships in Bahrain, a result that placed her firmly among the top young racers in her category.

The following year, 2024, Ruby advanced to senior and international levels, competing in CKC (Senior), OKN (OK Novice), and RMCC (Senior) events. The OKN class is a karting category designed for younger drivers, typically aged 12 and up, featuring 125cc engines and serving as an important developmental step for future racing talent. Despite racing against older and more experienced competitors, Ruby consistently delivered strong results, securing several podiums, including runner-up and third-place finishes, as well as a top-ten performance at the Rotax Asia Cup.

In 2025, Ruby took another leap forward by participating in the FIA Academy, alongside national competitions in CKC (China Karting Championship) — the top competition in China — and CKMC (China Karting Max Challenge). Her commitment and discipline paid off with two championship titles, plus runner-up and third-place finishes in competitive fields. What makes 2025 even more remarkable is that Ruby also began competing in Formula and TCR (Touring Car Racing)categories, stepping into the world of powerful, high-speed cars that demand precision, strategy, and incredible focus. Moving from karting to these advanced racing formats marks a major milestone in Ruby's career, one that showcases not only her rapid progress but also her readiness to take on the challenges of professional-level motorsport.

From her championship-winning beginnings in 2023 to her high-speed Formula and TCR debut in 2025, Ruby's racing journey showcases determination, talent, and passion. She continues to inspire both on and off the track, proving that with dedication and drive, it's possible to chase your dreams, even when they move at over 200 kilometers per hour.

### 2. Create crafts for change

Handmade goods don't just bring joy — they can also raise funds. After learning about the U.N. Sustainable Development Goals and the gender gap in education access, American student Ella Ross, who lives in Tianjin, China, founded her social enterprise MMiRi at age 12. MMiRi sells handmade, eco-friendly products like all-natural lip balms and soaps. Now 17, Ella partners with Malala Fund and has raised more than 5,000 RMB for girls' education, proving that even small-scale projects can have a big impact.
